Green care for isolated inmates



Literature study proclaimed that inmates suffer from psychological stress caused by social isolation and lack of meaningful activities. Moreover, the prison context has a negative influence on executive functions (inhibition, memory, attention,...). Garden therapy, in this context, has a positive impact on various domains: less aggression, less stress, better learning behavioral,... The objective is to offer meaningful green activities for vulnerable inmates and explore the added value as a stepping stone to the normal training offer, to well-being and reintegration. This study is conducted with students of occupational therapy and green management in the context of a penitentiary institution with an action research approach that lasts several years.

To prepare the students for this, a summer school is organised every year in September. During an interdisciplinary week (Occupational Therapy and Green Management), within the unique setting of Katarsis (Center for Addict Care), the students will become acquainted with the various possibilities that the medium "garden" can offer. Observation, consultation, experience, participation, design, sustainability, team building and relaxation are all important aspects. In addition, visits and practical lessons take place at various locations (the Castle Gardens of Hex, Leuven Penitentiary institution, Hasselt Penitentiary institution,...). The students are guided throughout the week by experts who work almost daily with the valuable medium "garden" within their professional setting. Academics, philosophers, occupational therapists, landscapers, trend watchers, volunteers, gardeners, clients,... are the sounding board and encourage to look at the subject from different perspectives.

We use different learning methods that continuously alternate:

- interactive lesson moments
- group assignments
- practice moments
- intervision moments

The interaction between the subject matter offered with the insights and experiences of the participants gives a unique color to this unique learning process.

Green Care as defined by Bragg, R. and Atkins, G. (2016) "nature-based therapy or treatment interventions - specifically designed, structured and facilitated for individuals with a defined need". Green Care includes Social and Therapeutic Horticulture, Animal Assisted Therapies, environmental conservation therapy and green exercise therapy. These are targeted therapeutic or treatment interventions and are delivered by trained/qualified practitioners.

It is a pleasure to inform you about the past month news from Escola Universit ria d'Infermeria i Ter pia Ocupacional de Terrassa, Universitat Aut noma de Barcelona. We have carried out various occupational therapy research activities.

On one hand, on November 19, 2020, the ceremony of the II edition of Dr Silvia Sanz Victoria Grant Award was celebrated. This grant has two award categories: professional occupational therapist's research and student's research. This award aims to pay tribute to the occupational therapist, Dr Silvia Sanz Victoria, who left us on May 17, 2018, after 10 years as a teacher at EUIT. The trajectory of Dr Silvia Sanz was marked by her concern around a gender perspective in occupational therapy, community approaches, as well as advocacy for the human rights of people with functional diversities. Dr Silvia Sanz Victoria was recognised for her commitment to research and teaching as well as for her dedication in keeping alive the interests of the students towards a critical perspective of occupational therapy. This grant intends to give continuity to her heritage, career, and contributions to the development of the discipline of Occupational Therapy.

Thus, in this 2020 edition, the winning projects have been awarded to:

Maria Yasmin Rosario Vidal (professional category) for her research proposal "Construction on wheels: A path to functional independence in boys and girls diagnosed with myelomeningocele."

Rut Alsina Santana (student category) for her research proposal "Evaluation Group of Cognitive Accessibility in Terrassa."

We will have the participation of experts as Eva Llarch Pinell (OT, Parc Sanitari Pere Virgili, Research Group RE-Fit NCN @ VHIR), Georgina Martínez (OT, management group, Hospital Universitario de la Vall d'Hebron), and Leen de Coninck (KU Leven, Arteveldehogeschool, and OT Europe representative to EFPC).

The webinar will be held in Spanish but will have international guests.

Tallinn Health Care College is pleased to announce that it has been 20 years since the education of occupational therapy in Estonia began.

In 2000 the cooperation commenced with the Swedish Association of Occupational Therapists (Project leaders Inga-Britt Lindström, Inga-Britt Bränholm, Chris Kerstin Henriksson, and Lia Lasn). The 20 years have passed in the blink of an eye. We have worked hard to ensure high quality higher education for occupational therapists.

Until the beginning of the school year of 2020 it was only possible to study occupational therapy in Tallinn Health Care Collage that is located in Tallinn. The demand for occupational therapists is great in different Estonian areas hence we have established a student group in Ida-Virumaa (the eastern region of Estonia) and we are piloting a workplace-based learning. The average interest has been with 7.5 people applying for one position. In the span of 20 years, 154 occupational therapists have graduated and, as of now, 65 students are on their way to becoming occupational therapists.

For the past 20 years, international relations have been extremely important to us. Thanks to the NATO Trust Fund on Medical Rehabilitation we have had the opportunity to contribute to occupational therapy education in Ukraine. The first occupational therapy course for Ukrainian students took place in 2016 and the second occupational therapy complementary course (Teaching of Teachers for Ergo Therapy Masters) took place in the spring of 2019. We would especially like to acknowledge and praise the occupational therapists and the associations of occupational therapists of Sweden, Finland, Belgium, Latvia, Denmark and Lithuania.

There is still a lot of work to be done, but we are extremely grateful for the cooperation and support for the past 20 years and look forward for the next 20 years.

Gender and Disability seminar: A double exclusion and its impact on development

This two-day seminar has been held on October 23rd and 24th, in a face-to-face and telematic way, in order to highlight different North–South knowledge transfer initiatives, organised by Padre Ossó Faculty and medicusmundi Norte – Spain.

The opening lecture was conducted by the occupational therapist Manuel Cruz and entitled “Between the Streets and Grindr”, and the closing

lecture by Jennifer Pitter Lopez, from “Light for the World”, with the title “Leave no Woman Behind”. In addition, three simultaneous workshops were held on the 23rd and 24th:

1. Good practices in North–South knowledge transfer. The following projects and initiatives were presented:

- International Cooperation and Activities of Daily Living: occupational therapy in Sahrawi refugee camps, offered by Nuria Menéndez, occupational therapist.

- “Joining Horizons from Occupational Therapy”. Telerehabilitation programme in Kalana (Mali), conducted by Occupational Therapy students volunteers on the program: Ana González, Leyre Lakarra, Sandra Cuesta y Laura Solís.

- “Live Spanish” A service-learning project with African universities, presented by M^a Ángeles González-Galán, from the COETIC research group of UNED.

2. Low-cost Assistive Technology, given by Monica Palacio, with the talk: “The use of low-cost assistive technologies in Cambodja”, and “Low cost support products in food in different cultures” by the students of the Degree in Occupational Therapy, Aitor Anido, Raúl Vigil, Andrea Arenas e Irene Pérez and the Coordinator of the Degree in Occupational Therapy, Estíbaliz Jiménez.



3. Functional diversity in the classroom, organised by Neus Verdú, lecturer of the Degree in Early Childhood Education, and M^a José Castaño, coordinator of the Degree in Primary Education at Padre Ossó Faculty.

It was a successful seminar, with a lot of interesting information and a high participation. 130 people attended the sessions, offered for the first time in a double format: face to face and online.

When the SPOTEurope team gave the feedback about the results, we discovered that we were competing to each other. Later, we got in touch and started to talk about creating a mini SPOT in our school.

After contact with the SPOTEurope team, we talked to our educational programme coordinator, Professor Dulce Gomes, which is the ENOTHE representative from our school. However, she couldn't support us because she is now one of the deans of the school and didn't have the available time to help us. We were still in need of a professor who could represent us in ENOTHE, so Professor Dulce Gomes suggested we talked to Professor Elisabete Roldão and she accepted immediately!

The first steps were established! We proceeded to contact all the OT students from our school in order to create our own team. Students from the 2nd, 3rd and 4th year step forward and are part of this project. The main reason we didn't yet include the 1st year students it's because the school first year is delay due to the pandemic. However, as soon as possible, we hope to be able to include another member from the 1st year in our team.

This miniSPOT will not only be a place to promote the connection and internationalisation between students from different places, but also an opportunity to promote Occupational Therapy in Portugal and Europe or, who knows, even in the rest of the world. Hopefully, this miniSPOT can also be a way to get to know different opinions and experiences that can improve our competences as OT students.

We are very proud and excited to finally implement a miniSPOT in our school and we hope that this project goes as far as we dreamed it.

Clinical practice in a prison: The ComuniTer Project

It is recognised that prisoners, from young offenders through to those serving longer sentences, can have complex health and care needs. Like anyone, prisoners have the right to health and wellbeing and should have access to good integrated health and care support.

Occupational therapy is considered to be one of the key professions in adult care and support and aims to improve health and wellbeing through participation in occupation (the activities, roles and routines of daily life), and can provide an important contribution to prison services. In Portugal there are still few studies about the performance of occupational therapists in prisons because it is still a rarity to find these kind of health professionals being part of a team in Portuguese prison establishments.

The importance of preparing occupational therapy students for community practice has recently entered into the occupational therapy literature as a topic of importance and so, with a youth detention center next to the School of Health Sciences of Leiria, the Occupational Therapy Course developed a new project - "ComuniTer" - with a purpose of fieldwork education to provide occupational therapy students with the opportunity to apply their academic education in the clinical setting.

This was a pilot project because the youth detention center of Leiria has no Occupational Therapist in its team and so the OT students have to be guided and supervised by Lecturers of the OT course. The main goals of the OT intervention program for the prisoners were: health promotion activities; life skills programmes; interventions to help offenders gain insight into lifestyle choices and which promote pro-social behaviour; and helping prepare for re-integration into the community, including through educational and vocational rehabilitation programmes. Opportunities to improve access to meaningful occupations, develop a strong professional language and clarify the professional contribution to the multi-disciplinary team occurred and in this way the outcome of Occupational Therapy Course of School of Health Sciences of Leiria was successful.

Although the fieldwork experience at the jail is a relatively new experience, we believe performing occupational therapy fieldwork with "ComuniTer Project" gives students many opportunities to engage in multiple traditional and non-traditional roles, perform best practice, and develop clinically and professionally in the areas of social and psychosocial disabilities. The Occupational Therapy Course of Polytechnic of Leiria is sure that students who are open to performing fieldwork affiliations in non-traditional settings will benefit by gaining unique and diverse skills that are marketable in many different practice settings.

News from Projects & Partners

Joint action towards best practice in OT Education about School-based Occupational Therapy

In 2019 at the ENOTHE meeting in Athens a project was initiated in order to establish an evidence-informed OT curriculum for school-based OT including fieldwork opportunities. The project group aimed to:

- Develop common curriculum guidelines for undergraduate and postgraduate education to use and adapt to their own national context.
- Provide guidelines for supporting students on diverse and innovative fieldwork opportunities in emerging areas of practice at all levels of their national education system
- Engage students in research and practice development projects in the areas of school-based OT either as part of OT educators' projects or student-directed projects.

The corona crises made it impossible for most of us to travel and at the same time many OTs struggled to work in a school-setting. Therefore, the project did not develop as fast as it was planned. However, during an online workshop for participants from the ENOTHE community in July 2020, some curriculum content for School-based Occupational Therapy was identified and prioritised.

In February 2021 a further workshop is planned in order to define clear learning objectives based on this content. Furthermore, practice examples which show how fieldwork experience can be implemented in a Bachelor's programme will be gathered. Practical training and a school setting experience should also be facilitated in countries where School-based Occupational Therapy is not yet established.

We are looking for the best way to share all the elaborated objectives regarding School-based Occupational Therapy with all ENOTHE Members at the end of the project, in order to promote Occupational Therapy in schools.

COPILLOT 2020

In 2020 COPILLOT team managed to reach all milestones by turning challenges into opportunities.

The 4th transnational meeting that was to take place in March at the University of Ruse, Bulgaria, was cancelled in the last minute due to the global pandemic situation. Nevertheless the team managed to conduct the meeting online, and has since then organized 10 more virtual meetings and a number of small group meetings in between.

All intellectual products are in good progress. Working drafts of the model and manual have been discussed and accepted. A collection of 7 topics with 12 modules is approved, 6 of them fully developed with study guides and piloted, and the rest are under construction. The collection of OERs has reached 200 and keeps growing. The webinar will be developed in Sway – a new Microsoft application for presentations.

In March two modules were piloted – *Am I an OT* and *OT professional identity across Europe*, as well as the traditional *ICC@Home*.

The next two pilot modules were launched on September 21st. Nearly 80 students from Austria, Belgium, Bulgaria, the Netherlands and Sweden took part in the module *Family occupations through generations*. They explored how patterns of work and leisure have changed throughout generations in one family and compared them with the findings of their colleagues from other countries.

The module *OT goes Public: Spreading OT in Europe* brought together nearly 30 students from Belgium, Bulgaria and the Netherlands in order to develop (inter)national strategies for spreading OT in Europe with a focus on a specific target group.

The spring of 2021 will be very busy, with three more pilot modules being tested, producing short videos, and getting ready for the final dissemination of our products. Cultural diversity of participants will be expanded with students from Romania and France.

The main aim of the **Erasmus+ UKROTHE project** is to increase the knowledge of Occupational Therapy in Ukraine, and translate it into updated courses and study programmes. When the project was written, it was still unclear how the study programme to become an Occupational Therapist would be included in the current higher education system. Now it is clear that, in the first phase, there will be a joint degree at both bachelor and master

level of Physical Therapy and Occupational Therapy.

In normal circumstances we would have organised practical face to face train-the-trainer sessions, however, we are refocusing and adapting our project timeline to the pandemic situation.

Therefore, we will start in December 2020 with the first part of the digital train-the trainer programme. 20 teachers and PT therapists from Ukraine will follow the courses coached by Occupational Therapist experts of VIVES (College University, BE), IPPorto (Porto Polytechnic Institute, PT) and Tapas (NGO, ES). The courses will address the foundations and models of Occupational Therapy, ICF, Interprofessional collaboration and research skills. The second part of the train-the- trainer sessions will include practical sessions and case specific target groups. We are hopeful to meet face to face mid 2021.

P4PLAY, the EU-funded PhD Programme in Occupational

Science dedicated to play, is due to commence in January 2021.

The programme received 100 applications from over 30 different countries worldwide. Following a rigorous recruitment process, eight early-stage researchers have been selected for the programme which is a collaboration between the Departments of Occupational Science and Occupational Therapy from four academic institutions, and a number of partner organisations

In Memoriam - Ann Carnduff

Ann Carnduff died unexpectedly but peacefully on 25th June 2020. Ann was the Head in the Glasgow OT school which was a part of the Glasgow Caledonian University till retiring in 2001.

Right from the beginning of the foundation of ENOTHE in 1995 in Aarhus in Denmark Ann was elected as the first secretary of the board. She participated in several working groups concerning curriculum guidelines and quality assurance. Ann and Rona Howard co-authored the ENOTHE book: "Occupational Therapy Education in Europe: Quality Enhancement-International Peer Review"(2004). Together they undertook several international peer reviews for ENOTHE in Bordeaux, Prague, Stockholm and Vienna.



Ann participated actively in nearly all annual ENOTHE meetings for more than a decade and she also encouraged her students to take part in the annual ENOTHE projects.

Between 1996 and 2007 she was involved in several European projects like "upgrading OT education in the Czech Republic" (a TEMPUS project 1996-2000), "Facilitation and Participation of Persons with Disabilities in Armenia and Georgia" (a TEMPUS project 2003-2006), "Facilitation and Participation of Young Persons with Disabilities in an Enlarged Europe" (an EU Jointaction programme in Romania, Bulgaria and Hungary 2003-2007). Ann also taught the basics of occupational therapy in Belarus and Poland.

Ann worked enthusiastically for ENOTHE for more than ten years and was an active board member till 2007.

We will remember Ann as a hardworking, talented and committed board member and as a great ambassador for the profession and for international OT work. She always will be remembered as a cordial and hospitable woman with great commitment, loyalty and joie de vivre- an inspiration to all of us.
